

OM at Home Volunteering: Audio Transcription Project



About the Audio Transcription Project

The archival collection at the Oshawa Museum features one-of-a-kind documents, maps, literature, and photographs; we also have a large collection of cassette tapes featuring historical talks, oral interviews, and the like. Many cassette tapes have been digitized, but having a written transcript of the audio file is of great use and benefit for the archivist and future researchers. It also makes an audio file accessible to those who are hearing impaired, increasing accessibility to the collection.

The purpose of this project is for volunteers to assist in transcribing these audio files.

Volunteer Expectations

- Volunteers can access the audio files from the Oshawa Museum's Google Drive:

- In that same Google Drive, there is a Google Sheet, tracking all the audio and what needs transcribing. Please review the sheet and select an audio file that has not been filled. Each audio file needs to be transcribed by two (2) volunteers.
 - Please leave your name by the audio file you will work on. First name is fine, or first name and initial of last name; if you are not comfortable leaving your first name, please write FILLED, and then email Lisa (membership@oshawamuseum.org) to let her know which file you are working on.
- Volunteers are asked to transcribe the audio files and email the transcripts:
 - Word format: to Lisa Terech, Community Engagement (membership@oshawamuseum.org).
 - Google Docs: to Lisa Terech via OM's Gmail address (socialmedia.ocm@gmail.com)
- Volunteers are asked to track the amount of time spent on their transcriptions; hours are important for the OM for grants, budgets, etc.
 - Having accurate hours is especially important for high school students who want hours signed towards their 40 hours of Community Service. If we do not have an accurate account of hours, we will not be able to sign.
- Volunteers are asked to email their hours to Lisa Terech, Community Engagement (membership@oshawamuseum.org). We ask that hours can be sent *at least* at the end of the month – OM staff will be in contact to remind you! You can keep a monthly log for yourself and email once the month is up, or, you can send an email along after each transcription session.

About the Oshawa Museum
